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
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

DEVONPORT 4WD RALLY

letter from Bill Templer, exspeedway competitor and proprietor of the Devonport Car Corral, containing an invitation to cover the 4th Annual 4WD Rally on behalf of the Devonport Four Wheel Drive Club in Tasmania, was soon acknowledged with a quick phone call of acceptance, and in no time Willie and I were heading down south.

The rally is a unique national event in that it caters for the average 4WD family, providing a guarantee of enjoyment, comradeship and fun, yet requires all the driving skills and experience of competitors.

A few years ago, Bill and the club organisers realised the potential of such an event and linked some of the popular 4WD trails together to form a 120-km course which includes forestry tracks, H.E.C. trails, private properties, creek crossings and lots of clay and mud patches.


Right up to a few days before the event, weather conditions had been sunny and dry. The club prayed for rain — and rain they got . . . buckets of it, developing in gale conditions.


On the Friday afternoon I went along with Bill and the club's organisers to check and mark the course. The wet

conditions, however, had changed things and several sections were deleted because of the dangerous and slippery conditions of the now very soggy terrain.

Saturday morning saw a field of 52 entries, mostly from the north-west coast, but some came from as far as Gravelly Beach on the Tamar, Campbell Town, Hobart and one lonely enthusiast, Michael Robey, from Sydney, NSW.

Starting positions were determined by ballot, and at 8.30 sharp the first competitors, Cedric and Carol Sheehan, in their ex-Army Dodge pick-up, were









on their way, armed with direction instructions for the five sections, measured to one tenth of a kilometre.

The rally's five sections took competitors through the Kentish and Latrobe municipalities and over magnificent, deep-green, rolling hills, valleys, steep climbs, through mud and water, across powerline trails and short highway runs.

The rain, which had temporarily stopped earlier, began again to fall in certain sections — which added to the excitement and presented the competitors with an additional challenge as some of the terrain began to deteriorate rapidly.

The second and third sections in the pine plantation began to tell their story as a large number of competitors began to lose points here and it became evident that the front runners were consolidating their lead.

Rodney Ray, driving Bill's CJ5 with MB skin, took first outright with a loss of 197 points, whilst his brother Bill was right behind him in second spot with a loss of 222 points. Only eleven points behind Bill was the third member of this amazing family, brother Leon with wife Jenny in a 3-cylinder Suzuki.

The lady of the day was Joy Walkden who, with her 13-year-old daughter/navigator, took the 1st Daihatsu trophy with a loss of 392 points. She also took the first lady-driver trophy. Her husband, competing in a Toyota, finished with a loss of 459 points.

Forty-four competitors finished the rally; only eight did not. The presentation of prizes and trophies was held at The Don Cricket Club straight after the

event and during a tasty barbecue and quite a few cans of Tasmanian ale.

Overall, the rally was a great success. Much of it was contributed to by the generous support of its major sponsor, Ted Eustace — also an ex-speedway man — and all the others who helped by donating trophies and prizes to the tune of \$700.00.

The dedicated core members of the Devonport 4WD Club, Dave Ingram, Bill Templer, Brian Imlock, Rodney French, Ross Penney, David Redpath and Joe Allan, who manned the checkpoints, undertook recovery duties, assisted competitors in need, rerouted the course during the actual running and kept a careful watch on the points scores.

We would also like to honour the many ladies who provided lunches, including Christine Ingham and Ann French who worked the time scores, Maureen Imlock, June Moore and Cheryl Rockliff who took care of the barbecue. Bravo to you all! Willie and I enjoyed your hospitality and enthusiasm very much indeed.

Perhaps next year, come September, we may see some interested mainland 4 wheelers competing in the annual Devonport 4WD Rally.
